WEST OHIO CONFERENCE

"Wings of the Morning Caravan Campaign"

Tucked into a corner of the Lubumbashi International Airport, among the decaying relics of military planes and abandoned freighters, is The United Methodist Church's hanger. In a country with few roads and very little infrastructure, the small, white, metal warehouse with the church's signature red Cross and Flame is a remarkable sight. Founded in 1960, Wings of the Morning, an aviation ministry supported by the church, provides help and hope for the sick, wounded, and dying in remote areas of the country with life-saving medical treatment. Gaston Ntambo, for the past 14 years, has flown accident-free while war raged and violence left close to four million people dead from starvation or disease in the remote areas where Ntambo regularly goes.

The Conference and Bishop Ough are committed to purchasing a needed Turboprop Cessna to replace the aging plane now in use. It is a larger plane that uses jet fuel readily available in the Congo. A larger plane would mean more medicine, more patients, and eventually doctors could be carried where there are people in desperate need. In addition with a population hungry for the Gospel, the leadership of Bishop Ntambo and missionaries has been planting churches across the conference such that the North Katanga Conference is now the fastest growing in United Methodist. Travel to all these villages is only possible because of the aviation ministry.

At Annual Conference we hope to fully fund the Wings of the Morning Caravan Campaign. One part of helping to make this happen would be making an additional gift to the campaign. Even though Wings of the Morning has been underwritten at Annual Conference, your gifts would help meet any shortfall in other's commitments. Mark your gifts "Wings." Thank you.

TRIP TO MATTHEW 25 MINISTRIES

On Saturday, June 23rd, a group of seven women, along with two vehicles loaded with bags of leftover clothing from our recent church rummage sale, arrived at Matthew 25 Ministries in Blue Ash. After unloading the clothing, we attended an orientation where we learned about the history and purpose of this local as well as international mission. Then we were given an assignment in the warehouse and

spent two hours volunteering our time to help organize donations.

On previous trips we had spent time sorting clothing. This time, however, we were taken to an area where several huge boxes of shoes were waiting. Our job was to sort the shoes by size, tie the shoestrings together, place a rubber band around the pair of shoes, and put them in another huge box. Seven of us worked for two hours and still did not get completely finished. These shoes had been donated by Men's Warehouse. They were good-looking, shiny patent leather formal shoes. Most were black, but there were also a few white pairs and wing tips. The sizes ranged from small children's shoes to men's size 14. We came to several conclusions as we searched, matched, tied and tossed each pair into the bin. We noticed that most of the shoelaces were tied, thus indicating that at the end of whatever celebration these shoes had attended, the person wearing them may have been exhausted from dancing and was too tired to untie them! So it was our job to untie each one and attach it to its mate. For some reason, lots of "left feet" were left over, thus leading us to believe that men have two left feet! Some seemed to be more worn on the bottom than others, indicating the "I can't dance" syndrome!

As we were leaving, a challenge was thrown out – we are to watch for any news clips depicting people in third world countries and if they are wearing shiny shoes, we can say we had a hand in preparing those shoes for shipment to those in need with the hope that the shoes will provide necessary covering for many feet that may otherwise have nothing to wear. This sign was above the door as we walked out of the warehouse – **"Because you came today, someone will be helped tomorrow!"**

Way To Go, Trolley Tours Vacation Bible School, June 25-28, 2012

We are having so much fun at Way To Go! Trolley Tours VBS! We start in a cardboard town with a red trolley and learn songs like Love the Lord your God and When I Get down, He Lifts Me Up. The kids love the old fashioned song: Allelu, Allelu, Allelu, Alleluia....Praise Ye the Lord. The kids stand up and sing one part and then adults stand and sing the other part. Guess which side is louder? You got it, the kids win every time. Mark Habel and Mike Hawkins lead the songs and go over the Bible verse we are memorizing. Luke 10:27 says Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, with all your mind and love your neighbor as yourself. Many VBS programs tell the kids God so loved the world, God loves them, God is wild about them; this is the first VBS that instructs them to Love the Lord your God. I think this is an important message and an important commandment. We need to love God with all our hearts, souls, strengths and minds.

The last part of that verse tells us to love our neighbor as our self. Our mission in this VBS is to love our neighbors. We are taking an offering to buy the Living Water kids ice cream. Also we made stamped tags and decorated flower pots. Tomorrow we plant a snapdragon in the pot and give it to our neighbor. The pots and tags turned out so nice The neighbors will love them. Debbie Hawkins, crafts leader, has them making a wooden bird feeder and a painted Frisbee for themselves. The kids also made a button that says Luke 10:27.

The team of actors takes us back to Bethlehem where we hear the story of Ruth, who would not leave her widowed mother-in-law, Naomi. Where you go, I will go, your people will be my people and your God will be my God. Ruth left her home and traveled back to Bethlehem with Naomi. Ruth gleaned grain from the fields and found herself treated kindly. She meets the owner of the fields, Boaz, a kinsman of Naomi, and he invites her to take her meals with the workers. Ruth ends up marrying Boaz. Their son Obed is the great, great grandfather of King David and an ancestor of Jesus. On Tuesday we saw two disciples going from Jerusalem to their home in Emmaus after Jesus was crucified. They were confused and depressed. Their whole world was turned upside down by the crucifixion of Jesus. He was their leader and now he was gone. Along the way they invited a stranger to walk with him. The stranger helped them understand what the scriptures say about the Messiah. The disciples invite the stranger into their house for a meal. When the stranger says the blessing and breaks the bread, they recognize him! He is Jesus, the risen Christ. Did not our heart burn with in us while he was explaining the scripture to us?

Of course kids are hungry for nachos and cheese or s'mores. Snacks are important part of VBS; it is a time to chill out with the others and talk. Games are fun filled obstacle courses and making bubbles. The preschoolers are enjoying a sand box and all the toys in their rooms. We will have the traditional water balloons on the last day.

We prayed for the kids to come and they did. We had 47 children on Monday and 2 more came on Tuesday. There are 10 teen helpers to lead the 'crews' of children from activity to activity: Aly Baldwin, Brooke and Wyatt Bolser, Will Hawkins, Leah Moore, Kayla Pate, Katherine Rand, Katherine Schindler, Lilly Steger and Taylor Swinney.
