Dear Friends,



We have been exposed to the Core Processes of United Methodist Church life for several years. However, as both of our churches move into the future, we need to be more intentional about these core processes and the committees that help them happen.

This issue of the Newsletter let me lift into our focused attention these four core processes. In that way as we complete 2008 and move into a new year, we can

explore how they can make our churches strong and more healthy.

Peggy Garrison, the new Pastor at First UMC in Hamilton, shared with her people the following (used by permission):

"You might ask, 'What do the core processes have to do with me?" I would suggest that you have lived them in your life of faith, or you would not still be involved in a worshipping congregation. How?

Radical Hospitality – Someone taught you that you were welcome at church. It might have been your parents who brought you. Maybe it was a sermon that told you that God loved you, regardless. At some point, you experienced radical hospitality that invited you into that fellowship.

Passionate Worship – When the Bishop starts talking about this core process, he recalls his childhood and the importance of the organ for his worship. That is what made his worship passionate. We are not talking about one style of worship, but something that moves our souls – brings out our passion for God. It could be silence. It could be jumping up and down as you sing a song. For many of us the most passionate worship we experienced was at campfires. The point is that the focus is on God and not the form.

Faith Forming Relationships – I do not care what anyone says; we cannot be a Christian by ourselves. When we are alone, it is too easy to think that what we think is what God thinks. We need others to expand our faith, to call us to witness, or teach us to pray. These are faith forming relationships. Most of us know them as Sunday School, where a group struggles with faith questions around God's word. We need to know other people and to be known by them. We need an experience of Jesus in our midst. You know what Jesus said, "where two or more are gathered in my name...."

Risk Taking Service – If all I do with my faith is to sit in church, then I have not been a faithful Christian. John Wesley taught us that we have to take our faith to where people are. That means we need to be engaged in missions, both local and global. Sometimes the mission is within the church family, such as helping refresh a couple's lawn who could no longer garden. Sometimes it is in the community, such as the meal at Living Waters. Sometimes the mission is around the world, such as the Nothing But Nets campaign to limit malaria. All of this is service for God.

I invite you with me to be a part of these four core processes. I invite us to be a church that is grounded in God's love and lives out our call. It is past time for us to seek new ways to do God's work. Let's work together.

Victims are helpless, at the mercy of the offender. By showing mercy <u>to</u> an offender, you put yourself back in control. Take charge by forgiving.

ME! A CARETAKER?

"This is my home and this is my family. I'm no caretaker."

That would probably be our reaction if someone came to us and tried to tell us that the things we have do not really belong to us. And yet that is exactly what the Bible tells us. In Psalm 24:1 we read, "The Earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof; the world and they that dwell therein."

Is not everything we have a gift from God? The Apostle Paul writes to the Christians at Corinth, "What hast thou that thou didst not receive?" (1 Cor. 4:7) Every Christian knows that the answer to this question is, "Nothing." God has given us everything we have, even life itself. Because all that we have and all that we are belongs to God, we do not spend our time, our strength, and our money to please ourselves, but to please God.

What does this mean? Specifically, how can we live to please God? Certainly God wants us to spend part of our time, talent and resources on ourselves and our families. God has given us our lives and expects us to enjoy them in God's service. God also wants us to give for the needs – both physical and spiritual – of others.

How can we best do this? By giving to our church and community. Christ founded the church to preach to the world and to minister to the needy in God's name. Whenever we give to the church we are doing this work for Christ. We do not give to the church because we expect to receive anything in return. We give to the church because that is what God wants us to do with our money. Remember that it is not ours, but God's; we are simply the caretakers.

How much then should we give to the church? The New Testament offers several answers to this question. When Zacchaeus, the dishonest tax collector, became a Christian, he told Jesus that he would give half of his wealth to feed the poor. (Lk 19:1-10) When Mary of Bethany realized that Jesus was soon to be crucified, she bought the most expensive gift she could find to give to him. (Jn 12:1-8) When Barnabas, the Levite from Cyprus, became a Christian, he sold all the land that he owned and brought the money to the apostles. (Acts 4:36-37) The action of each of these individuals was different yet each was giving their money in a way that was pleasing to God.

How can we be sure that our gifts are pleasing to God? Here are some suggested ways:


- Pray about your giving. When the offering basket is
 passed in church imagine that it is Jesus who is holding it.
 Put into it what you would not be ashamed for him to
 see. Through your giving show him how much you are
 willing to sacrifice for him, who sacrificed his life for
 you.
- 2) Consider the needs of the church. Consider what your church can do in the name of Christ at home and around the world if you give generously. Ask yourself, "What kind of church would this church be if every parishioner gave just as I do?"
- 3) Consider the Biblical standard of the tithe. Before Christ came to save his people they were commanded to give a tenth of their income to God. Now that Christ has come can we give any less?

All people are caretakers. Nothing belongs to us; everything belongs to God. Not everyone realizes this, but Christians do and strive to please God in the use of all that God has put in their care.

"Yes, I'm a caretaker - God's caretaker!"

IN THE SPOTLIGHT THIS MONTH Lester & Bernice Coleman

Let us draw near to God with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith... Hebrews 10:22



INTERVIEW

Lester and Bernice Coleman are a quiet, modest couple who for many years have diligently labored in faith to serve the Lord at McGonigle-Millville Church. Although this interview was to be about both of them, Bernice in her usual "shy" way, directed the conversation to Lester. Lester, a man of few words, did share that his church heritage goes back to his birth almost three-quarters of a century ago. His parents, who then lived on Darrtown Road, came, bringing him, his brother Robert, and sister Juanita. The church then was like a one room school house, heated by a stove which sat where the choir now sits. On cold days, "you could see your breath," and until 1980 the church had an outhouse. Their memories are many as they have seen pastors come and go, and Lester remembers when some of the early speakers were students from Miami University. The "faith" lessons of Hebrews must have been strong in their hearts, as there was never any money, but with the help of the Lord, they always found a way. Eddie Beeler, the church treasurer, once reported the balance of 67 cents, saying, "We aren't broke, just badly bent." When it was time to replace the old wooden windows or to purchase the adjacent ground, they simply took a "leap of faith," baked a lot of pies, held early yard sales in the 1960s - that had mostly clothes and a few dishes. Annual Homemade Ice Cream Socials were done by members mixing the ingredients, taking this to Oxford to be frozen, then packing in hot (dry) ice for the trip back to church.

Lester served in the Army and when he returned, he met the love of his life, Bernice, in 1960 at a square dance at LeSourdsville Lake. They married in September, 1961. This brought Bernice into our church, followed by their three children, Kenny, Lawrence and Norma Jean. There were no little ones attending at this time and Bernice said everyone was excited at the birth of Kenny. (Hasn't be been a blessing to this church!) Lester worked for the Talawanda Schools and after their children were older, Bernice worked at McCullough-Hyde Hospital for 18 years before retiring.

All the while, Lester and Bernice have labored at church wherever needed; cleaning the church for awhile, and serving on various committees and functions. Bernice has taught Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and now sings in the choir. These last few years have brought many struggles with various health problems, but their devotion to God and their church family has never wavered. They are thankful for the caring love they share with their church family and the joy their various church activities has brought into their lives.


